

The Office of Engagement's Person-Centered Approach to Accessing Higher Education

The University of Utah's **Office of Engagement** connects the community with promises of higher education from preschool through high school. First, by helping young people IMAGINE and believe they can go to college, then by mentoring and preparing them through the process, and finally by assisting them to DO. Our programs foster real achievement through counseling, mentoring, and connecting students to supportive college resources.



Defining Your Path | DYP

The Office of Engagement invites K-8th grade students to connect and engage with higher education through the *Defining Your Path* Field Trip Program. Field trips to the University of Utah are valuable learning experiences that spark students' interest and help enlighten the path to higher education. Visiting campus helps to eliminate the intimidation and pressure that many students associate with going college. Through to constructivist approach, students engage in handson learning activities, interact with college students and faculty, and set goals to reach higher education. This year DYP continued its partnership with the Utah Cultural Celebration Center and Granite School School District, and collaborated with 40 academic departments and student support services to facilitate meaningful college exploration experiences.

Education Pathways: *Uintah Basin*

In collaboration with the Ute Indian Tribe Education Department the University of Utah takes an active role in providing post secondary school planning to the Ute Indian Tribe students in the Uintah Basin. Our goal is for every student upon graduating from high school to have a post secondary school plan, whether that be employment, a community college or technical college or a four year college here in Utah or beyond.

Education Pathways: Community Learning Center

The Glendale-Mountain View Community Learning Center (CLC) sits between Glendale Middle School and Mountain View Elementary School to build a community school campus on the Westside of Salt approximately With 60 different Lake City. partnerships, the CLC provides access to resources and services to students and their families in the areas of early childhood education; youth academics and enrichment; adult education and enrichment: and health and wellness. The University of Utah, through the Office of Engagement, forms an integral role in reach. With a full-time CLC's **Education** Coordinator placed at the CLC students and their families get direct one-on-one support in building and/or continuing their education pathway.

Utah College Advising Corps | UCAC

The Utah College Advising Corps (UCAC) is a University-based college access initiative. UCAC seeks to help Utah students from low-income, firstgeneration, and underrepresented backgrounds attend college. UCAC advisers work alongside highschool staff to assist students in navigating admissions applications. financial aid forms. scholarship applications, college entrance exam registration & preparation, and identifying first-year programs at the institution they will attend.

The Council on Student Access (COSA) works with K-12 students from historically underrepresented communities and helps them identify and access their passions within higher education. By enlisting current U of U students who are passionate about college access and seek to contribute to meaningful academic experiences, COSA is able to facilitate purposeful interactions between enrolled college students and young, future college students and encourage them to pursue their unique goals. Each acadmic members of COSA year, identify communities in need of meaningful mentorship and provide support in their journey to college. During the 2019/20 fiscal year, COSA acted as main support for the Defining Your Path Field Trip Program and worked closely with the Uintah Basin Ute Tribe and Promise South Salt Lake (After-school Program).




